

—『カンタベリ物語・総序の歌』用語索引（4）—

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A Concordance to *The General Prologue in The Canterbury Tales* (4)

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Geoffrey Chaucer の “*The Canterbury Tales*” は、既に幾つかの用語索引がこれまでに作成されている。J. S. P. Tatlock と A. G. Kennedy による “*A Concordance to the Complete Works of Geoffrey Chaucer and to the Romount of the Rose*”<sup>1)</sup> は A. W. Pollard のテキスト *The Globe Edition*<sup>2)</sup> を基に作られた労作であるが、その後のテキスト編纂は時代と共に進展し、近年最新のテキスト “*The Riverside Chaucer*”, based on *The Works of Geoffrey Chaucer* edited by F. N. Robinson<sup>3)</sup> が出版され、そしてこれに基づく用語索引が相次いで刊行された。一つは大泉昭夫氏による “*A Complete Concordance to the Works of Geoffrey Chaucer*”<sup>4)</sup> であり、いまひとつは Larry D. Benson による “*A Glossarial Concordance to the Riverside Chaucer*”<sup>5)</sup> である。しかしこれらはいずれも “*The Canterbury Tales*” の中

で展開する個々の「物語」を、独立させた用語索引として掲載していない。しかし、各「物語」を独立した作品と考え、そこでの使用語彙のより詳細な言葉の環境を捉えるには、それぞれについての用語索引が是非とも必要となる。

“*The Canterbury Tales*”の中で展開する個々の「物語」の中に登場する多様な語彙が、その前後の言語環境を通して作品の中で、どのような語義の広がりや機能を果たしているかを探ることが先ず‘Concordance’作成によって可能となる。又、それぞれの‘Word List’作成によって、如何様な語彙が作品の中で分布しているか、個々の語彙環境を総合的に鳥瞰することが可能となる。Chaucerの“*The Canterbury Tales*”の一部を形成するこの“*The General Prologue*”の文学世界を文体と語彙の面において一層効率的に把握することの助けとなるはずである。

この‘Concordance’と‘Word List’を作成するにあたり、テキストは“*The Riverside Chaucer*”を使用した。又、沖田電子技研(有)の文章解析プログラム・Micro-OCPを使用し、東個人が手で打ち込んだものと同技研から出されているElectronic Text Library Line-upの中の“*Chaucer, Complete Works*”を使用した。

“*The General Prologue*”の中に登場する各語彙について、先ず‘Concordance’を作成する。次にアルファベット順による‘Word List (1) (Alphabetical Order)’と、頻度順による‘Word List (2) (Sorted by Frequency)’を作成して、最後に“*The Riverside Chaucer*”版を元到手打ちした‘The Text of *The General Prologue*’を掲載する予定である。Text作成では、第一行目を1として表記し、その右側に“*The Riverside Chaucer*”版による相当行を記入する。ここでは“*The General Prologue*”の‘Concordance’として(その4)の作成を試みた。
