

—『免罪符売りの話の初め, 序, と物語』用語索引 <Word List> (5) —

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A Concordance <Word List> to *The Pardoner's Introduction, Prologue and Tale in The Canterbury Tales* (5)

Geoffrey Chaucer の『カンタベリー物語』は、既に幾つかの用語索引がこれまでに作成されている。J. S. P. Tatlock と A. G. Kennedy による “A Concordance to the Complete Works of Geoffrey Chaucer and to the ‘Romount of the Rose’ ”¹⁾ は A. W. Pollard のテキスト The Globe Edition²⁾ を基に作られた労作であるが、その後のテキスト編纂は時代と共に進展し、近年最新のテキスト “*The Riverside Chaucer*”, based on *The Works of Geoffrey Chaucer* edited by F. N. Robinson³⁾ が出版され、そしてこれに基づく用語索引が相次いで刊行された。一つは大泉昭夫氏による “A Complete Concordance to the Works of Geoffrey Chaucer”⁴⁾ であり、いま一つは Larry D. Benson による “A Glossarial Concordance to the Riverside Chaucer”⁵⁾ である。しかしこれらはいずれも『カ

『カンタベリー物語』の中で展開する個々の「物語」を、独立させた用語索引として掲載していない。しかし、各「物語」を独立した作品と考え、そこでの使用語彙のより詳細な言葉の環境を捉えるには、それぞれについての用語索引が是非とも必要となる。

『カンタベリー物語』の中で展開する個々の「物語」の中に登場する多様な語彙が、その前後の言語環境を通して作品の中で、どのような語義の広がりや機能を果たしているかを探ることが、先ず‘Concordance’作成によって可能となる。又、それぞれの‘Word List’作成によって、如何様な語彙が作品の中で分布しているかによって個々の語彙環境を総合的に鳥瞰することが可能となる。Chaucerの『カンタベリー物語』の一部を形成するこの“*The Pardoner’s Introduction, Prologue and Tale in The Canterbury Tales*”の文学世界を文体と語彙の両面において一層効率的に把握することの助けとなるはずである。

この‘Concordance’と‘Word List’を作成するにあたり、テキストは“*The Riverside Chaucer*”を使用した。又、沖田電子技研(有)の文章解析プログラム・Micro-OCPを使用し、東個人が手で打ち込んだものと、同技研から出されているElectronic Text Library Line-upの中の“*Chaucer, Complete Works*”を使用した。

“*The Pardoner’s Introduction, Prologue and Tale in The Canterbury Tales*”の中に登場する各語彙について、先ず‘Concordance’を作成した。次にアルファベット順による‘Word List (1) (Alphabetical Order)’と頻度順による‘Word List (2) (Sorted by Frequency)’を作成し、最後に“*The Riverside Chaucer*”版を元に手打ちした“*The Pardoner’s Introduction, Prologue and Tale in The Canterbury Tales*”を掲載する。Text作成では第一行目を1として表記し、その右側に“*The Riverside Chaucer*”版による相当行を記入した。

今回は“*The Pardoner’s Introduction, Prologue and Tale in The Canterbury Tale*”の最終回として‘Concordance (5) <Word List>’及び‘Text’の作成を試みた。

108 (VI 570) He is in Spaigne, right at the toune of Lepe
109 (VI 571) Nat at the Rochele, ne at Burdeux toun‐
110 (VI 572) And thanne wol he seye Sampson, Sampson!
111 (VI 573) But herkneth, lordynges, o word, I yow preye,
112 (VI 574) That alle the sovereyn actes, dar I seye,
113 (VI 575) Of victories in the Olde Testament,
114 (VI 576) Thurgh verray God, that is omnipotent,
115 (VI 577) Were doon in abstinence and in preyere.
116 (VI 578) Looketh the Bible, and ther ye may it leere.
117 (VI 579) Looke, Attila, the grete conquerour,
118 (VI 580) Deyde in his sleep, with shame and dishonour,
119 (VI 581) Bledynge ay at his nose in dronkenesse.
120 (VI 582) A capitayn sholde lyve in sobrenesse.
121 (VI 583) And over al this, avyseth yow right wel
122 (VI 584) What was comaunded unto Lamuel‐
123 (VI 585) Nat Samuel, but Lamuel, seye I;
124 (VI 586) Redeth the Bible, and fynde it expresly
125 (VI 587) Of wyn-yevyng to hem that han justise.
126 (VI 588) Namooore of this, for it may wel suffise.
127 (VI 589) And now that I have spoken of glotonye,
128 (VI 590) Now wol I yow deffenden hasardrye.
129 (VI 591) Hasard is verray mooder of lesynges,
130 (VI 592) And of deceite, and cursed forswerynges,
131 (VI 593) Blaspheme of Crist, manslaughter, and wast also
132 (VI 594) Of catel and of tyme; and forthermo,
133 (VI 595) It is repreeve and contrarie of honour
134 (VI 596) For to ben holde a commune hasardour.
135 (VI 597) And ever the hyer he is of estaat,
136 (VI 598) The moore is he yholden desolaat.
137 (VI 599) If that a prynce useth hasardrye,
138 (VI 600) In alle governaunce and policye
139 (VI 601) He is, as by commune opinioun,
140 (VI 602) Yholde the lasse in reputacioun.
141 (VI 603) Stilboun, that was a wys embassadour,
142 (VI 604) Was sent to Corynthe in ful greet honour
143 (VI 605) Fro Lacidomye to make hire alliaunce.
144 (VI 606) And whan he cam, hym happede, par chance,
145 (VI 607) That alle the gretteste that were of that lond,
146 (VI 608) Pleyynge atte hasard he hem fond.
147 (VI 609) For which, as soone as it myghte be,
148 (VI 610) He stal hym hoom agayn to his contree,

149 (VI 611)	And seyde, Ther wol I nat lese my name.
150 (VI 612)	Ne I wol nat take on me so greet defame.
151 (VI 613)	Yow for to allie unto none hasardours.
152 (VI 614)	Sendeth othere wise embassadours;
153 (VI 615)	For, by my trouthe, me were levere dye
154 (VI 616)	Than I yow sholde to hasardours allye.
155 (VI 617)	For ye, that been so glorious in honours.
156 (VI 618)	Shul nat allyen yow with hasardours
157 (VI 619)	As by my wyl, ne as by my trettee.
158 (VI 620)	This wise philosophre, thus seyde hee.
159 (VI 621)	Looke eek that to the kyng Demetrius
160 (VI 622)	The kyng of Parthes, as the book seith us.
161 (VI 623)	Sente him a paire of dees of gold in scorn,
162 (VI 624)	For he hadde used hasard ther-biforn;
163 (VI 625)	For which he heeld his glorie or his renoun
164 (VI 626)	At no value or reputacioun.
165 (VI 627)	Lordes may fynden oother maner pley
166 (VI 628)	Honest ynough to dryve the day awaye.
167 (VI 629)	Now wol I speke of othes false and grete
168 (VI 630)	A word or two, as olde bookes trette.
169 (VI 631)	Gret sweryng is a thyng abhominable,
170 (VI 632)	And fals sweryng is yet moore reprevable.
171 (VI 633)	The heighe God forbad sweryng at al.
172 (VI 634)	Witnesse on Mathew; but in special
173 (VI 635)	Of sweryng seith the hooly Jeremye.
174 (VI 636)	Thou shalt swere sooth thyne othes, and nat lye.
175 (VI 637)	And swere in doom and eek in rightwisesse;
176 (VI 638)	But ydel sweryng is a cursednesse.
177 (VI 639)	Bihoold and se that in the firste table
178 (VI 640)	Of heighe Goddes heestes honorable.
179 (VI 641)	Hou that the seconde heeste of hym is this:
180 (VI 642)	Take nat my name in ydel or amys.
181 (VI 643)	Lo, rather he forbedeth swich sweryng
182 (VI 644)	Than homycide or many a cursed thyng:
183 (VI 645)	I seye that, as by ordre, thus it stondest;
184 (VI 646)	This knoweth, that his heestes understondeth.
185 (VI 647)	How that the seconde heeste of God is that.
186 (VI 648)	And forther over, I wol thee telle al plat
187 (VI 649)	That vengeance shal nat parten from his hous
188 (VI 650)	That of his othes is to outrageous.
189 (VI 651)	By Goddes precious herte, and By his nayles,
190 (VI 652)	And By the blood of Crist that is in Hayles.
191 (VI 653)	Sevene is my chaunce, and thyn is cynk and treye!
192 (VI 654)	By Goddes armes, if thou falsly pleye.
193 (VI 655)	This daggere shal thurghout thyn herte go!
194 (VI 656)	This fruyt cometh of the bicched bones two,
195 (VI 657)	Forsweryng, ire, falsnesse, homycide.
196 (VI 658)	Now, for the love of Crist, that for us dyde.
197 (VI 659)	Lete youre othes, bothe grete and smale.
198 (VI 660)	But, sires, now wol I telle forth my tale.
199 (VI 661)	Thise riotoures thre of whiche I telle.
200 (VI 662)	Longe erst er prime rong of any belle.
201 (VI 663)	Were set hem in a taverne to drynke.
202 (VI 664)	And as they sat, they herde a belle clynke
203 (VI 665)	Biforn a cors, was caried to his grave.
204 (VI 666)	That oon of hem gan callen to his knave:
205 (VI 667)	Go bet, quod he, and axe redily
206 (VI 668)	What cors is this that passeth heer forby;
207 (VI 669)	And looke that thou reporte his name weel.
208 (VI 670)	Sire, quod this boy, it nedeth never-a-deel;
209 (VI 671)	It was me toold er ye cam heer two houres.
210 (VI 672)	He was, pardee, an old felawe of youre.
211 (VI 673)	And sodeynly he was yslayn to-nyght.
212 (VI 674)	Fordronke, as he sat on his bench upright.
213 (VI 675)	Ther cam a privee thief men clepeth Deeth.
214 (VI 676)	That in this contree al the peple sleeth.
215 (VI 677)	And with his spere he smoot his herte atwo.
216 (VI 678)	And wente his wey withouten wordes mo.
217 (VI 679)	He hath a thousand slayn this pestilence.
218 (VI 680)	And, maister, er ye come in his presence.
219 (VI 681)	Me thynketh that it were necessarie
220 (VI 682)	For to be war of swich an adversarie.
221 (VI 683)	Beth redy for to meete hym everemoore;
222 (VI 684)	Thus taughte me my dame; I sey namoore.
223 (VI 685)	By Seinte Marie! seyde this taverner.
224 (VI 686)	The child seith sooth, for he hath slayn this yeer.
225 (VI 687)	Henne over a mile, withinne a greet village.
226 (VI 688)	Bothe man and womman, child, and hyne, and page;
227 (VI 689)	I trowe his habitacioun be there.
228 (VI 690)	To been avysed greet wysdom it were.
229 (VI 691)	Er that he dide a man a dishonour.
230 (VI 692)	Ye, Goddes armes! quod this riotour.
231 (VI 693)	Is it swich peril with hym for to meete?
232 (VI 694)	I shal hym seke by wey and eek by strete.

233 (VI 695) I make avow to Goddes digne bones!
 234 (VI 696) Herkneth, felawes, we thre been al ones;
 235 (VI 697) Lat ech of us holde up his hand til oother,
 236 (VI 698) And ech of us bicomem otheres brother.
 237 (VI 699) And we wol sleen this false traytour Deeth.
 238 (VI 700) He shal be slayn, he that so manye sleeth,
 239 (VI 701) By Goddes dignitee, er it be nyght!
 240 (VI 702) Togidres han thise thre hir trouthes plight
 241 (VI 703) To lyve and dyen ech of hem for oother,
 242 (VI 704) As though he were his owene ybore brother.
 243 (VI 705) And up they stirte, al dronken in this rage,
 244 (VI 706) And forth they goon towardses that village
 245 (VI 707) Of which the taverner hadde spoke biforn.
 246 (VI 708) And many a grisly ooth thanne han they sworn,
 247 (VI 709) And Cristes blessed body they torente‐
 248 (VI 710) Deeth shal be deed, if that they may hym hente!
 249 (VI 711) Whan they han goon nat fully half a mile,
 250 (VI 712) Right as they wolde han troden over a stile,
 251 (VI 713) An oold man and a povre with hem mette.
 252 (VI 714) This olde man ful mekely hem grette,
 253 (VI 715) And seyde thus, Now, lordes, God yow see!
 254 (VI 716) The proudeste of thise riotoures three
 255 (VI 717) Answerde agayn, What, carl, with sory grace!
 256 (VI 718) Why artow al forwrapped save thy face?
 257 (VI 719) Why lyvestow so longe in so greet age?
 258 (VI 720) This olde man gan looke in his visage,
 259 (VI 721) And seyde thus: For I ne kan nat fynde
 260 (VI 722) A man, though that I walked into Ynde,
 261 (VI 723) Neither in citee ne in no village.
 262 (VI 724) That wolde chaunge his youthe for myn age;
 262 (VI 725) And therfore moot I han myn age stille,
 264 (VI 726) As longe tyme as it is Goddes wille.
 265 (VI 727) Ne Deeth, allas, ne wol nat han my lyf.
 266 (VI 728) Thus walke I, lyk a resteleees kaityf,
 267 (VI 729) And on the ground, which is my moodres gate,
 268 (VI 730) I knokke with my staf, bothe erly and late,
 269 (VI 731) And seye Leeve mooder, leet me in!
 270 (VI 732) Lo how I vanysse, flessch, and blood, and skyn!
 271 (VI 733) Allas, whan shul my bones been at reste?
 272 (VI 734) Mooder, with yow wolde I chaunge my cheste
 273 (VI 735) That in my chambre longe tyme hath be,
 274 (VI 736) Ye, for an heyre clowt to wrappe me!
 275 (VI 737) But yet to me she wol nat do that grace,
 276 (VI 738) For which ful pale and welked is my face.
 277 (VI 739) But, sires, to yow it is no curteisye
 278 (VI 740) To speken to an old man vileynye.
 279 (VI 741) But he trespasse in word or elles in dede.
 280 (VI 742) In Hooly Writ ye may yourself wel rede:
 281 (VI 743) Agayns an oold man, hoor upon his heed,
 282 (VI 744) Ye sholde arise; wherfore I yeve yow reed,
 283 (VI 745) Ne dooth unto an oold man noon harm now,
 284 (VI 746) Namooore than that ye wolde men did to yow
 285 (VI 747) In age, if that ye so longe abyde.
 286 (VI 748) And God be with yow, where ye go or ryde!
 287 (VI 749) I moot go thider as I have to go.
 288 (VI 750) Nay, olde cherl, by God, thou shalt nat so,
 289 (VI 751) Seyde this oother hasardour anon;
 290 (VI 752) Thou partest nat so lightly, by Seint John!
 291 (VI 753) Thou spak right now of thilke traytour Deeth.
 292 (VI 754) That in this contree alle oure freendes sleeth.
 293 (VI 755) Have heer my trouthe, as thou art his espye,
 294 (VI 756) Telle where he is or thou shalt it abyde,
 295 (VI 757) By God and by the hooly sacrement!
 296 (VI 758) For soothly thou art oon of his assent
 297 (VI 759) To sleen us yonge folk, thou false theef!
 298 (VI 760) Now, sires, quod he, if that yow be so leef
 299 (VI 761) To fynde Deeth, turne up this croked wey,
 300 (VI 762) For in that grove I lafte hym, by my fey,
 301 (VI 763) Under a trec, and there he wole abyde;
 302 (VI 764) Noght for youre boost he wole him no thyng hyde.
 303 (VI 765) Se ye that ook? Right there ye shal hym fynde.
 304 (VI 766) God save yow, that boghte agayn mankynde,
 305 (VI 767) And yow amende! Thus seyde this olde man;
 306 (VI 768) And everich of thise riotoures ran
 307 (VI 769) Til he cam to that tree, and ther they founde
 308 (VI 770) Of floryns fyne of gold ycoyned rounde
 309 (VI 771) Wel ny an eighte busshels, as hem thoughte.
 310 (VI 772) No lenger thanne after Deeth they soughte,
 311 (VI 773) But ech of hem so glad was of that sighte,
 312 (VI 774) For that the floryns been so faire and brighte,
 313 (VI 775) That doun they sette hem by this precious hoord.
 314 (VI 776) The worste of hem, he spak the firste word.
 315 (VI 777) Bretheren, quod he, taak kep what that I seye;
 316 (VI 778) My wit is greet, though that I bourde and pleye.

317 (VI 779)	This tresor hath Fortune unto us yiven
318 (VI 780)	In myrthe and joliftee oure lyf to lyven.
319 (VI 781)	And lightly as it comth, so wol we spende.
320 (VI 782)	Ey, Goddes precious dignitee! Who wende
321 (VI 783)	To-day that we sholde han so fair a grace?
322 (VI 784)	But myghte this gold be caried fro this place
323 (VI 785)	Hoom to myn hous, or elles unto youres
324 (VI 786)	For wel ye woot that al this gold is oures
325 (VI 787)	Thanne were we in heigh felicitee.
326 (VI 788)	But trewely, by daye it may nat bee.
327 (VI 789)	Men wolde seyn that we were theves stronge.
328 (VI 790)	And for oure owene tresor doon us honge.
329 (VI 791)	This tresor moste ycaried be by nyghte
330 (VI 792)	As wisely and as slyly as it myghte.
331 (VI 793)	Wherfore I rede that cut among us alle
332 (VI 794)	Be drawe, and lat se wher the cut wol falle;
333 (VI 795)	And he that hath the cut with herte blithe
334 (VI 796)	Shal renne to the town, and that ful swithe,
335 (VI 797)	And brynge us breed and wyn ful prively.
336 (VI 798)	And two of us shul kepen subtilly
337 (VI 799)	This tresor wel; and if he wol nat tarie,
338 (VI 800)	Whan it is nyght, we wol this tresor carie.
339 (VI 801)	By oon assent, where as us thynketh best.
340 (VI 802)	That oon of hem the cut broghte in his fest.
341 (VI 803)	And bad hem drawe and looke where it wol falle;
342 (VI 804)	And it fil on the yongeste of hem alle.
343 (VI 805)	And forth toward the toun he wente anon.
344 (VI 806)	And also soone as that he was gon,
345 (VI 807)	That oon of hem spak thus unto that oother:
346 (VI 808)	Thow knowest wel thou art my sworn brother;
347 (VI 809)	Thy profit wol I telle thee anon.
348 (VI 810)	Thou woost wel that oure felawe is agon.
349 (VI 811)	And heere is gold, and that ful greet plentee.
350 (VI 812)	That shal departed been among us thre.
351 (VI 813)	But nathelees, if I kan shape it so
352 (VI 814)	That it departed were among us two,
353 (VI 815)	Hadde I nat doon a freendes torn to thee?
354 (VI 816)	That oother answerde, I noot hou that may be.
355 (VI 817)	He woot that the gold is with us tweye;
356 (VI 818)	What shal we doon? What shal we to hym seye?
357 (VI 819)	Shal it be conseil? seyde the firste shrewe,
358 (VI 820)	And I shal tellen in a wordes fewe
359 (VI 821)	What we shal doon, and brynge it wel aboute.
360 (VI 822)	I graunte, quod that oother, out of doute,
361 (VI 823)	That, by my trouthe, I wol thee nat biwrewe.
362 (VI 824)	Now, quod the firste, thou woost wel we be tweye,
363 (VI 825)	And two of us shul strengre be than oon.
364 (VI 826)	Looke whan that he is set, that right anoon
365 (VI 827)	Arys as though thou woldest with hym pleye,
366 (VI 828)	And I shal ryve hym thurgh the sydes tweye
367 (VI 829)	Whil that thou strogelest with hym as in game.
368 (VI 830)	And with thy daggere looke thou do the same;
369 (VI 831)	And thanne shal al this gold departed be.
370 (VI 832)	My deere freend, bitwixen me and thee.
371 (VI 833)	Thanne may we bothe oure lustes all fulfille.
372 (VI 834)	And pleye at dees right at oure owene wille.
373 (VI 835)	And thus acorded been these shrewes tweye
374 (VI 836)	To sleen the thridde, as ye han herd me seye.
375 (VI 837)	This yongeste, which that wente to the toun,
376 (VI 838)	Ful ofte in herte he rolleth up and down
377 (VI 839)	The beautee of these floryns newe and brighte.
378 (VI 840)	O Lord! quod he, if so were that I myghte
379 (VI 841)	Have al this tresor to myself allone,
380 (VI 842)	Ther is no man that lyveth under the trone
381 (VI 843)	Of God that sholde lyve so murye as I!
382 (VI 844)	And atte laste the feend, oure enemy,
383 (VI 845)	Putte in his thought that he sholde poyson beye.
384 (VI 846)	With which he myghte sleen his felawes tweye;
385 (VI 847)	For-why the feend foond hym in swich lyvyngre
386 (VI 848)	That he hadde leve him to sorwe brynge.
387 (VI 849)	For this was outrely his fulle entente,
388 (VI 850)	To sleen hem bothe and nevere to repente.
389 (VI 851)	And forth he gooth, no lenger wolde he tarie,
390 (VI 852)	Into the toun, unto a pothecarie,
391 (VI 853)	And preyde hym that he hym wolde selle
392 (VI 854)	Som poyson, that he myghte his rattes quelle;
393 (VI 855)	And eek ther was a polcat in his hawe,
394 (VI 856)	That, as he seyde, his capouns hadde yslawe,
395 (VI 857)	And fayn he wolde wreke hym, if he myghte,
396 (VI 858)	On vermyn that destroyed hym by nyghte.
397 (VI 859)	The pothecarie answerde, And thou shalt have
398 (VI 860)	A thyng that, also God my soule save,
399 (VI 861)	In al this world ther is no creature
400 (VI 862)	That eten or dronken hath of this confiture

401 (VI 863) Noght but the montance of a corn of whete.
 402 (VI 864) That he ne shal his lif anon forlete;
 403 (VI 865) Ye, sterve he shal, and that in lasse while
 404 (VI 866) Than thou wolt goon a paas nat but a mile,
 405 (VI 867) This poyssoun is so strong and violent.
 406 (VI 868) This cursed man hath in his hond yhent
 407 (VI 869) This poyssoun in a box, and sith he ran
 408 (VI 870) Into the nexte strete unto a man,
 409 (VI 871) And borwed of hym large botelles thre,
 410 (VI 872) And in the two his poyson poured he;
 411 (VI 873) The thridde he kepte clene for his drynke.
 412 (VI 874) For al the nyght he shoop hym for to swynke
 413 (VI 875) In cariynge of the gold out of that place.
 414 (VI 876) And whan this riotour, with sory grace,
 415 (VI 877) Hadde filled with wyn his grete botels thre,
 416 (VI 878) To his felawes agayn repaireth he.
 417 (VI 879) What nedeth it to sermone of it moore?
 418 (VI 880) For right as they hadde cast his deeth bifoore,
 419 (VI 881) Right so they han hym slayn, and that anon.
 420 (VI 882) And whan that this was doon, thus spak that oon:
 421 (VI 883) Now lat us sitte and drynke, and make us merie,
 422 (VI 884) And afterward we wol his body berie.
 423 (VI 885) And with that word it happed hym, par cas,
 424 (VI 886) To take the botel ther the poyson was,
 425 (VI 887) And drank, and yaf his felawe drynke also,
 426 (VI 888) For which anon they storven bothe two.
 427 (VI 889) But certes, I suppose that Avycen
 428 (VI 890) Wroot nevere in no canon, ne in no fen,
 429 (VI 891) Mo wonder signes of empoisonyng
 430 (VI 892) Than hadde thise wrecches two, er hir endyng.
 431 (VI 893) Thus ended been thise homycides two,
 432 (VI 894) And eek the false empoysonere also.
 433 (VI 895) O cursed synne of alle cursednesse!
 434 (VI 896) O traytours homycide, O wikkednesse!
 435 (VI 897) O glotonye, luxurie, and hasardrye!
 436 (VI 898) Thou blasphemour of Crist with vileynye
 437 (VI 899) And othes grete, of usage and of pride!
 438 (VI 900) Allas, mankynde, how may it bitide
 439 (VI 901) That to thy creatour, which that the wroghte
 440 (VI 902) And with his precious herte-blood thee boghte,
 441 (VI 903) Thou art so fals and so unkynde, allas?
 442 (VI 904) Now, goode men, God foryeve yow youre trespas,
 443 (VI 905) And ware yow fro the synne of avarice!
 444 (VI 906) Myn hooly pardoun may yow alle warice,
 445 (VI 907) So that ye offre nobles or sterlynges,
 446 (VI 908) Or elles silver broches, spoones, rynges.
 447 (VI 909) Boweth youre heed under this hooly bulle!
 448 (VI 910) Cometh up, ye wyves, offreth of youre wolle!
 449 (VI 911) Your names I entre heer in my rolle anon;
 450 (VI 912) Into the blisse of hevene shul ye gon.
 451 (VI 913) I yow assoille, by myn heigh power,
 452 (VI 914) Yow that wol offre, as clene and eek as cleer
 453 (VI 915) As ye were born. And lo, sires, thus I preche.
 454 (VI 916) And Jhesu Crist, that is oure soules leche,
 455 (VI 917) So graunte yow his pardoun to receyve,
 456 (VI 918) For that is best; I wol yow nat deceyve.
 457 (VI 919) But, sires, o word forgat I in my tale:
 458 (VI 920) I have relikes and pardoun in my male,
 459 (VI 921) As faire as any man in Engelond,
 460 (VI 922) Whiche were me yeven by the popes hond.
 461 (VI 923) If any of yow wole, of devocion,
 462 (VI 924) Offren and han myn absolucion,
 463 (VI 925) Com forth anon, and kneleth heere adoun,
 464 (VI 926) And mekely receyveth my pardoun;
 465 (VI 927) Or elles taketh pardoun as ye wende,
 466 (VI 928) Al newe and fressh at every miles ende,
 467 (VI 929) So that ye offren, alwey newe and newe,
 468 (VI 930) Nobles or pens, whiche that be goode and trewe.
 469 (VI 931) It is an honour to everich that is heer
 470 (VI 932) That ye mowe have a suffisant pardoneer
 471 (VI 933) T'assoille yow in contree as ye ryde,
 472 (VI 934) For adventures whiche that may bityde,
 473 (VI 935) Paraventure ther may fallen oon or two
 474 (VI 936) Doun of his hors and breke his nekke atwo.
 475 (VI 937) Looke which a seuretee is it to yow alle
 476 (VI 938) That I am in youre felaweshipe yfalle,
 477 (VI 939) That may assoille yow, bothe moore and lasse,
 478 (VI 940) Whan that the soule shal fro the body passe.
 479 (VI 941) I rede that oure Hoost heere shal bigynne,
 480 (VI 942) For he is moost enveloped in synne.
 481 (VI 943) Com forth, sire Hoost, and offre first anon,
 482 (VI 944) And thou shalt kisse the relikes everychon,
 483 (VI 945) Ye, for a grote! Unbokele anon thy purs.
 484 (VI 946) Nay, nay! quod he, thanne have I Cristes curs!

485 (VI 947)	Lat be, quod he, it shal nat be, so theeche!
486 (VI 948)	Thou woldest make me kisse thyn olde breech,
487 (VI 949)	And swere it were a relyk of a seint,
488 (VI 950)	Though it were with thy fundement depeint!
489 (VI 951)	But, by the croys which that Seint Eleyne fond,
490 (VI 952)	I wolde I hadde thy coillons in myn hond
491 (VI 953)	In stide of relikes or of seintuarie.
492 (VI 954)	Lat kutte hem of, I wol thee helpe hem carie;
493 (VI 955)	They shul be shryned in an hogges toord!
494 (VI 956)	This Pardoner answerde nat a word;
495 (VI 957)	So wrooth he was, no word ne wolde he seye.
496 (VI 958)	Now, quod oure Hoost, I wol no lenger pleye
497 (VI 959)	With thee, ne with noon oother angry man.
498 (VI 960)	But right anon the worthy Knyght bigan,
